Santa Rosa County Emergency Management has implemented a county-wide emergency notification system, **AlertSantaRosa**. **Alert Santa Rosa** provides everyone who lives and works in Santa Rosa County with the ability to receive emergency notifications and/or severe weather via:

- Notification via smart phone app “Contact Bridge ”
- Text
- Email
- Phone call (to business, home or cell phone)

By enrolling, you can subscribe to receive notifications about emergencies that may affect your home, business, school, child care and more. Text messages will be received from **893-61** or **878-44**, and phone calls will generate from **1-850-983-5257**. Descriptions below.

- **Active Shooter Emergency Action Plan:** A great resource for individuals *unable to attend an in-person workshop* or those who would like a refresher. This 90 minute dynamic video describes the fundamental concepts of developing an emergency action plan for an active shooter scenario. It guides viewers through important considerations of a plan development by utilizing first-hand perspectives of survivors, first responders, and subject matter experts similar to the workshops.
- **Action Shooter Emergency Action Plan Trailer:** This one minute video provides a brief overview of the components of the Active Shooter Emergency Action Plan video.
- **Options for Consideration:** Replacing the previously available resource, this seven minute video demonstrates possible actions individuals can take if confronted with an active shooter; it provides updated information that includes considerations for individuals with disabilities and incorporation of technology into security practices.

If playing directly from the internet, please allow several minutes for the videos to buffer to your computer or device before playing for an audience.

Use of barricades policy: Free to parades and other events in Santa Rosa County that are sponsored by a chambers or government entities (Christmas parades, Mardi Gras, 4<sup>th</sup> of July, etc.) or non profits, that are hosting events that are free and open to the public. The user is responsible for transportation of barricades, AND banners advertising sponsors MUST be put on barricades. Others wanting to use the barricades must provide transportation and rent barricades at a cost of \$5 per barricade. Additional fees may be applicable if barricades are not returned within 7 days of pick up/delivery. Barricades will cost \$8 each if delivery is required. Average rental price for barricades is \$9-\$13 each through other vendors. SAFER barricades are a bargain.
